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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Authority Peachtree City Airport Authority Peachtree City, Georgia Tidwell DeWitt LLC

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Peachtree City

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities of Peachtree City Airport Authority, a component unit of City of Peachtree City, Georgia, as of and for the years ended September 30, 2004 and 2003, which comprise the Authority's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Authority's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the business-type activities of Peachtree City Airport Authority, as of September 30, 2004 and 2003, and the changes in financial position and cash flows, thereof for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated December 17, 2004, on our consideration of Peachtree City Airport Authority's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

The management's discussion and analysis on pages 3 through 7 are not a required part of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and

	Our audit was made for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that comprise Peachtree City Airport Authority's basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards and schedule of findings and questioned costs are presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations, and are not a required part of the financial statements of Peachtree City Airport Authority. The schedule of expenditures of federal awards and schedule of findings and questioned costs have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.
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MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Our discussion and analysis of the Peachtree City Airport Authority's financial performance provides an overall review of the Authority's financial activities for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2004. Please read it in conjunction with the Authority's financial statements, which begin on page 8. The intent of this discussion is to enhance the reader's understanding of the Authority's financial performance.

Financial Highlights

- The Authority's total assets increased by \$1,542,018
- The Authority's total liabilities increased by \$441,759
- The Authority's operating revenues increased by \$161,050
- The Authority's operating expenses increased by \$133,953
- The Authority's Federal grant revenues increased from approximately \$1.2 million to \$1.5 million due to increased grant availability during FY 2004.

Using this Financial Report

This annual report consists of the management's discussion and analysis and the financial statements. The financial statements include statements of net assets; statements of revenues; expenses and changes in fund net assets; and statements of cash flows. In addition, the notes to the financial statements provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the financial statements. These notes begin on page 12.

Current assets increased by \$70,541. This is mainly due to an increase in the Tax Exempt Capital Account.

Analysis of Overall Financial Positions and Results of Operations

The financial position of the Authority improved over the past year. The net assets increased by \$1,100,259. The Authority received more federal grant income in the fiscal year 2004 than in the previous year. This was used for land acquisition and capital improvements. The Authority has debt obligations of \$337,790 for paving of Stallings Road in fiscal year 2004.

Capital Assets

The fiscal year-ending balance of capital assets shows an increase of \$ 1,171,137. This increase is due to additions to capital assets exceeding accumulated depreciation.

Current Issues

In fiscal year ended September 30, 2004, construction continued in Hangar Area B that began in the FY 2004. Currently 4 of the 5 available sites have completed hangars constructed, with the final site in preliminary stages of construction. The access road Stallings, was eventually renamed Aviation Way; this area was completed in fall of 2004. The roof repair was completed in summer of 2004. Both projects were completed under budget. Monies left over from the \$ 350,000 loan for initial construction will be used toward funding further pavement of Aviation Way to additional acreage on the East side of the airport, in a joint project with the Peachtree City Water and Sewer Authority. An intergovernmental agreement is in the drafting and approval stage.

The Authority acquired approximately 60 acres on the eastern boundary of the airport adjacent to the Coweta County border. This acreage was purchased with a grant from the Federal Aviation Administration. The Authority is seeking additional Federal funds for taxiway construction for this area and the 24 acres previously purchased.

The Authority is also seeking Federal assistance in upgrading the instrument landing system (ILS) at Falcon Field. Efforts are underway with FAA and congressional supporters to upgrade from a

The City of Peachtree City is once again funding the hotel motel tax in which the airport is receiving approximately twenty (20) percent of taxes collected by the City. All funds held back by the City have been paid in full.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Business

On March 26, 1984 the General Assembly of the State of Georgia approved enabling legislation to create the Peachtree City Airport Authority (Authority).

The Authority was created to acquire, construct, equip, maintain, operate, own and improve airports and landing fields for the use of aircraft. On September 20, 1988, the Authority became the owner of Falcon Field Airport in Peachtree City, Georgia.

Financial Reporting Entity

The accompanying financial statements report on the financial activities of the Peachtree City Airport Authority. The financial statements have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to government units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. In accordance with the GASB's Statement No. 20, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Proprietary Funds and Other Governmental Units That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting, the Authority applies all applicable GASB pronouncements as well as the following pronouncements issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements: Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions, and Accounting Research Bulletins of the Committee on Accounting Procedure. In addition, the Authority applies all FASB Statements and Interpretations issued after November 30, 1989, except for those that conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements. The more significant of the Authority's accounting policies are described below.

The Authority is considered to be a component unit of the City of Peachtree City, Georgia, as defined by GASB Statement No. 14, *The Financial Reporting Entity*. The City exercises significant influence. Significant influence or accountability is based primarily on operational or financial relationships with the City (as distinct from legal relationships). The City appoints all board members of the Authority. The Authority and the City of Peachtree City have entered into an agreement whereby the City is obligated to make periodic payments to the Authority to assist in the payment of debt obligations and some operating costs.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Measurement focus and basis of accounting.

As a proprietary type fund, the Peachtree City Airport Authority uses the flow of economic resources measurement focus and the accrual method of accounting for revenues and expenses.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Authority's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted as they are needed.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The Authority receives 40 - 45% of its revenue from fuel sales and hangar rentals to local customers and pilots. A downturn in the economy could adversely affect fuel sales and hangar rentals used for its basic operations. The Authority carefully monitors credit lines extended to customers to minimize credit risks. The Authority also receives 45 - 50% of its total revenue from Federal and state grants and intergovernmental contributions for airport expansion, growth, and nonoperating expenditures. Since these funds are used for expansion, a decline in these revenues would not appear to be detrimental to the current year operations of the Authority.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Authority defines cash and cash equivalents as all cash in checking and savings accounts, money on hand and all highly liquid short-term debt instruments purchased with a maturity of ninety days or less.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

The carrying value of cash, receivables and accounts payable approximates fair value due to the short maturity of these instruments. The carrying value of short and long-term debt approximates fair value based on discounting the projected cash flows using market rates available for similar maturities.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or market, determined on the first in, first out (FIFO) method.

Accounts Receivable

The allowance for doubtful accounts is recorded in amounts required to provide adequate reserves to cover anticipated losses based on historical bad debt experience and a periodic evaluation of aging of accounts. Uncollectible accounts are charged to expense using the allowance method.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Property and Depreciation

Property and equipment are stated at cost. Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets. Maintenance and repairs and are charged to expense as incurred whereas major renewals and betterments are capitalized. When items of property or equipment are sold or retired, the related cost and accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is included in net income. Depreciation expense charged to operations was approximately \$673,000 and \$671,000 for the years ended September 30, 2004 and 2003, respectively.

The estimated useful lives for each major class of depreciable fixed assets are as follows:

Equipment 5 years
Land improvements 15-20 years
Buildings and improvements 15-20 years
Furniture and fixtures 10 years

Interest is capitalized on constructed fixed assets during the period of construction, if it is material. No interest was capitalized in the years ended September 30, 2004 and 2003.

Net Assets

Net assets represent the difference between assets and liabilities. Net assets invested in capital assets, consists of property, plant and equipment, net of accumulated depreciation on these assets. Net assets are reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors, or laws or regulations of other governments.

Management's Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Advertising

The Authority follows the policy of charging the costs of advertising to expenses as incurred. Advertising expense was approximately \$3,950 and \$0 for the years ended September 30, 2004 and 2003, respectively.

NOTE 2 - CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include money on hand and demand deposits. The book balance and bank balance of the Peachtree City Airport Authority's deposits, including money market accounts, are detailed below. The amount of the total book and bank balances are classified into three categories of credit risk: 1) cash that is insured or collateralized with securities held by the Authority or by its agent in the Authority's name, 2) cash collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's agent in the Authority's name, and 3) uncollateralized bank accounts.

NOTE 5 - GRANTS AND CONSTRUCTION COMMITMENTS

FAA Grant No. 15

During 2004, the Authority received FAA Grant offer No. 15. This is a reimbursable agreement to relocate automated surface observation system for a grant in the amount of \$66,500. No expenditures have been made and no grant received at September 30, 2004.

FAA Grant No. 16

During 2004, the Authority received FAA Grant offer No. 16. This is a grant for the acquisition of land for development and can be used for land, land development and planning. The total of the grant received was \$1,500,000. Total expenditures incurred for the project for the period ending September 30, 2004, was \$1,468,528.

State Department of Transportation Grant No. AP050-9002-16(113) Fayette

During 2004, the Authority received a grant offer from the State of Georgia for \$38,053 for additional land acquisition. At September 30, 2004, the Authority had not received or expended any of these funds.

NOTE 7 - CLAIMS AND JUDGMENTS

The Authority is the recipient of Federal, State and Local grants. Expenditures financed by grants are subject to audit by the appropriate grantor government. If expenditures are disallowed due to noncompliance with grant program regulations, the Authority may be required to reimburse the grantor government.

Significant amounts of grant expenditures in fiscal year ended September 30, 2004 and 2003 were audited as part of the Single Audit. There were no expenditures noted that were considered disallowed expenditures.

NOTE 8 - CONTINGENCIES, COMMITMENTS AND SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent to September 30, 2004, the Authority has committed \$150,000 to assist in construction of Phase II of Aviation Way. They are being assisted by other intergovernmental agencies in this project. Also, the Authority has offered to pay \$10,000 to assist in the redesign of the TDK Boulevard extension. This is to cover the engineering redesign of the road, which is necessary to keep the road extension out of the Authority's runway safety area.

NOTE 9 - HOTEL/MOTEL TAX

The City of Peachtree City collects a lodging tax. A portion of this tax is distributed to the Peachtree City Airport Authority for the promotion of tourism and to facilitate trade shows and conventions as required by O.C.G.A. 48-13-54. The City and Authority agreed in 1993 that proceeds from the lodging tax would by used to assist in servicing debt incurred to pay for the airport improvements and expansions as such improvements and expansions have been designed to promote tourism and trade. An intergovernmental agreement with the City was signed on November 7, 2002; this agreement provided the Authority with 13.3% of the total Hotel/Motel tax collected by the City and was effective through October 31, 2003. On July 14, 2004, another intergovernmental agreement was signed between Peachtree City Tourism Association and the Authority. This agreement provides for the Authority to receive 20% of the hotel/motel tax received by the Tourism Association from the City and was effective retroactive to November 1, 2003. During the years ended September 30, 2004 and 2003, the Authority received \$130,267 and \$118,472, respectively from the hotel/motel tax.

Additionally, the Authority had a receivable balance from the City of Peachtree City in the amount of \$10,490 at September 30, 2003. The Authority also had a receivable balance due to them from the Peachtree City Tourism Association at September 30, 2004 in the amount of \$10,367, which was included in the accounts receivable.

Peachtree City Water and Sewer Authority is assisting the Authority with Phase I and Phase II of the Aviation Way projects. They have contributed \$50,000 to the Authority in October of 2004 toward the Phase I project and are committed to contribute another \$150,000 to the Phase II project.

NOTE 11 - OPERATING LEASES

Rental Revenues

The Authority leases hangars, land and building space to corporations and individual pilots under non-cancelable long-term, renewable and month-to-month leases. Some of the hangars are built and owned by tenants, who are only leasing the land. The carrying value of leased assets of \$44,072 (cost of \$170,234 less accumulated depreciation of \$126,162) is included in the capital assets in the financial statements. Certain leases contain provisions for future increased revenues based upon changes in the Consumer Price Index. A rental company lease has provisions to pay the Authority a percentage of time and mile charges on the rental cars they lease at the Airport. NOTE A - BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards includes the federal grant activity of Peachtree City Airport Authority and is presented on the accrual basis of accounting. The information in this schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of OMB Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations. Therefore, some amounts presented in this schedule may differ from amounts presented in, or used in the preparation of, the basic financial statements.

NOTE B - MATCHING FUNDS

The matching funds for Project AIP 03-13-0146-15 are \$10,000 from the Authority. Also, \$2,600 in administrative overhead may be charged to this project, if not waived by the FAA

NOTE C - OPEN PROJECTS

Project AIP-03-13-0146-15 in the amount of \$66,500 was signed and accepted by FAA in August, 2004. This agreement is in effect for approximately two years and will be considered complete when the final bill has been paid. At September 30, 2004, no grant monies had been received or spent by the Authority. The Authority's matching portion of the grant is estimated to be \$10,000. Also, the Authority may have to pay \$2,600 to the FAA for administrative costs, unless the FAA waives the fee.

Project AIP 3-13-0146-16 in the amount of \$1,500,000 was received in 2004; however, only \$1,468,528 had been expended for purchase of approximately 60 acres of land and attorney fees. The additional monies held will be retained for land, land improvement or planning as deemed allowable by the FAA.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Peachtree City Airport Authority's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards.
